ACCOUNTABLE - We are responsible to each other and the community to ensure ethical leadership in all levels of the organization.



ABOUT US

THE BEGINNING: Law Enforcement in Beloit began in 1857 with the creation of a Justice of the Peace, a Sheriff and two Constables. The population of Beloit was 1,678, and the town was growing with the papermaking industry and establishment of Beloit College. In 1880, the Police Department was called the "Anti Horse-Thief Association" as this must have been one of the biggest concerns of residents! In 1902, a Police and Fire Commission was formed and the Marshal replaced by a Chief of Police. In 1940, the department had two police cars and 31 men, who earned about \$100 a month. There were 4 walking beats, and they worked 6 days and then had 2 days off. The 1950s saw many changes with the acquisition of an ambulance that was operated by Police Officers and our first teletype unit, allowing vehicle and people checks in a short period of time.

<u>TODAY:</u> Currently, the Beloit Police Department has an authorized sworn staff of 74 officers and 21 non-sworn staff. The Department serves the Beloit community with a population of 36,925 and 16.4 square miles. The Department is a leading agency in using honorable and progressive policing to create safe neighborhoods and connect with community on a personal level. We are also a leading agency in the recruitment of highly qualified employees that represent our community.





Hiring & Recruitment

HIGHLIGHTS

DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS FOR 2022

JANUARY 2022 Community collaboration resulted in the arrest of a suspect in the homicide that occurred in the parking lot of Beloit Memorial High School.

MARCH 2022 The Department partnered with Community Action to hold community meetings to educate citizens on our strategies to address violent crime and answer questions to build neighborhood relationships and trust. The first meeting was on violent crimes and our response, and the second meeting was on use of force and mental health. Both presentations were made at Hackett Elementary School and Merrill Community Center.



BUILDING A SAFER CITY TOGETHER

Join Community Action and the Beloit Police Department to learn about plans to address violent crime and to build neighborhood relationships and trust.

MARCH 2022 Through the use of camera and license plate reader technology, the Department was able to arrest Anthony Rechichi for robbing a local credit union. He was federally indicted.


JUNE 2022 The Department held Speeches at the Splash Pad in Vernon and Summit Parks.

AUGUST 2022 The Department held Conversations Around the Campfire at Big Hill Park.

NOVEMBER 2022 The Department implemented two new software programs. PowerDMS was implemented as a policy management system, which led the way for the City of Beloit to utilize the system. IAPRO was implemented to track and manage personnel complaints, use of force, pursuits, and open records requests.

Throughout 2022, police officers conducted 6,285 traffic stops. That is a 79% increase over 2021, when 3,517 were conducted. The increase in traffics stops provided safer roadways in the Beloit community and had a direct impact on lowering violent crime.
